Principal's Message

Hello Skyeeeehawks!

Dr. Eimear O'Brien, our superintendent, is retiring this year. She was hired as a third-grade teacher at Maple Creek when I was the school's GIS. My daughter was in her class. We go back a long time and have worked together in various roles throughout our careers—a wonderful person and educator. I will miss her. Although she has several, one of my favorite O'Brien quotes is "Clovis Unified leaders are stewards of a legacy of high standards for our students, for our teams and for ourselves". Simply, that's our job as educators: To get ALL students to meet those high standards. Another way to put it: To get ALL students on grade level in reading, writing, math, science, social studies, physical education (PE), and to behave like outstanding citizens. That is difficult work, and that's why Dr. O'Brien in her quote added "... high standards ... for our teams". The work that we do is difficult, so difficult that it takes staff and families working together (at high levels) to be successful.

How do we know that educators are getting students to meet those "high standards"? Well, we have several measurements: parent surveys, students surveys, staff surveys, grades, academic awards, etc. One of the most accurate ways to determine if students are growing towards those high academic standards are tests. Traditionally, the month of May is our heavy testing month. TK through 2nd grade take district tests, and grades 3 through 6 take a state test. Some people ask, "Why do we take testing so seriously?" or "Why do we focus on it so much?" Well, it's one of our most important indicators to determine if we're getting students to meet those "high standards". It's how we determine if we're successful or not. The test score indicates whether the student is above, on, or below grade level. We use test scores to also help us decide how to best serve the student based upon their ability level.

When someone asks us "Why are tests so important?", it's like asking a doctor "Why is surgery so important?" Well, a doctor's goal is to heal a patience, and a teacher's goal is to get a student on grade level. When we get a student, like a doctor, we assess the student's strengths and weaknesses. We apply instructional strategies, use intervention programs, develop a close relationship with the child to get to know the motivators and discouragers, etc. Once we diagnose the issues, we prescribe a plan for growth. If we have done our job well, we will hopefully cure the student of their academic difficulties. The student demonstrates his or her growth on the end-of -the-year test. Sometimes, students come to us with a lot of deficits, and so it may take more than one year to get them on grade level. But the goal is still "high standards" for all. With all the diversity of personalities and ability levels with our students, what changes is not the "high standard". We expect every student to perform at those high levels. What may change is how we get them there. One strategy may work for one student, but it may not work for another. Finding the right strategy that works may require the creative efforts for our teams, or it requires "high standards for our teams". We got to get good at what we do if we want ALL students on grade level.
